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

CHALLENGES

As a team working tirelessly to address LGBTQ challenges within the United States and reshape the landscape of LGBTQI refugee resettlement, we wanted to take a moment to reflect on the challenges we encountered during our efforts. Throughout this reporting year, we have faced numerous hurdles that have impacted the depth and reach of our work. We would like to highlight some of these challenges and acknowledge their significance:

The Global Crisis



Our focus solely on the United States, restricts our ability to capture the diverse experiences and challenges faced by LGBTQ individuals in other parts of the world.

- 1. Intersectionality: LGBTQ individuals who belong to multiple marginalized groups, such as LGBTQ immigrants or people of color, face unique challenges. Acknowledging and addressing the complexities of these intersecting identities in our report has been a significant undertaking. We recognize the importance of considering these dynamics to provide a more comprehensive understanding of the resettlement and integration experiences.
- 2. Limited Resources: As a small team, we have faced constraints in terms of time, personnel, and financial resources. These limitations have impacted the breadth and depth of our research, as well as the overall reach and impact of our report. Nevertheless, we remain committed to maximizing the effectiveness of our resources and continuously seeking opportunities for growth.



REFUGE 25 CAMPAIGN

Refuge America is launching the Refugee 25² Campaign, an awareness campaign designed to support LGBTQI refugees seeking asylum and refuge in the United States. With the changing landscape of refugee support and the introduction of welcome corps as a new sponsorship pathway, we aim to assist at least 625 LGBTQI individuals in finding safety, protection, and a sense of belonging by December 2025.
